She took the unusual step of personally accompanying Havel on his first official visit to Washington, riding along on the same plane.  Excerpt from *The Newspaper Worker, 1906: Designed for All Who Write, but Especially Addressed to the Reporter Who May Have Only a Vague Notion of the Aims, Scope and Requirements of His Profession* Ramsay in his *Life of Washington* notes the remarkable fact that men on the patriotic side in the American Revolution, who could scarcely write their names when the struggle with the mother country began, were capable at its close of producing letters that practiced, educated writers need not be ashamed to acknowledge. This is a striking, historic instance of what perseverance, intelligently directed, may accomplish. These men had to write so their language would be understood and admit of none save an exact interpretation. They wrote with care, and with strict attention to accuracy. They wasted no time on frills or cheap attempts at ornament. They learned almost intuitively to call things by their right names, and they avoided ambiguity because they knew that a misinterpretation of their meaning might lead to disaster and ruin. There can be no manner of doubt that these almost unlettered patriots carefully read over and freely criticized what they wrote, and that they became exact and explicit in expressing themselves, through sheer necessity of occasions. Washington was himself in the strictest sense of the word a self-educated man. He lost his father at an early age and his days in school were so few that he began life without so much as a rudimentary knowledge of English grammar. Bancroft, the historian, dealing with this period of Washington's life, remarks that the great liberator applied himself with care to everything that he undertook and that his preserved papers show how he almost imperceptibly gained the power of writing correctly and of "expressing himself with clearness and directness, often with felicity of language and grace." These are by no means isolated examples. Journalism can show equally remarkable instances of good, graphic writers developing out of crude, unpromising material. A case in point: An ambitious young man of little or no education who had tried successively driving team, soliciting life insurance and even bartending, became possessed with the belief that newspaper work

is ideal and that through it he could achieve his aim in life. He obtained a position on a daily newspaper in one of the inland New England cities. The first story that he wrote had concern with a street fight for which the supposed aggressor was arrested. In writing the story the new reporter had such expressions as this: "The prizoneer i witnizzis sae was not at fawlt. His nabors give him a gud nahn." Andrew Carnegie and his spelling reformers might have hailed him as brother, but the city editor decided that the new man had missed his vocation and frankly told him so. Law and Ethics for Today's Journalist Feb 26 2020 *Law and Ethics for Today's Journalist* offers aspiring and working journalists the practical understanding of law and ethics they must have to succeed at their craft. Instead of covering every nuance of media law for diverse communications majors, Mathewson focuses exclusively on what's relevant for journalists. Even though media law and media ethics are closely linked together in daily journalistic practice, they are usually covered in separate volumes. Mathewson brings them together in a clear and colourful way that practicing journalists will find more useful. Everything a journalist needs to know about legal protections, limitations, and risks inherent in workaday reporting is illustrated with highlights from major court opinions. Mathewson advises journalists who must often make ethical decisions on the spot with no time for the elaborate, multi-faceted analysis. The

book assigns to journalists the hard decisions on ethical questions such as whether to go undercover or otherwise misrepresent themselves in order to get a big story. The ethics chapter precedes the law chapters because ethical standards should underlie a journalist's work at all times. There may be occasions when ethics and law are not parallel, thus calling for the journalist to make a personal judgment. *Law and Ethics for Today's Journalist* is user-friendly, written in clear, direct, understandable language on issues that really matter to a working journalist. Supplementary reading of the actual court cases is recommended and links to most cases are provided in the text. The text includes a fine (but purposely not exhaustive) bibliography listing important and useful legal cases, including instructive appellate and trial court opinions, state as well as federal.

Conflict Reporting Strategies and the Identities of Ethnic and Religious

Communities in Jos, Nigeria Dec 06 2020

This book examines journalistic strategies in terms of the appropriation of media logics in the conflict frame-building process. Relying on three models (objectivity, mediatization and news framing), it interrogates the role orientations and performance of journalists who reported the conflict involving the 'indigenous' Christians and Hausa Fulani Muslim 'settlers' of Jos, a city in North Central Nigeria inhabited by approximately one million people. The book provides empirical evidence of the strategies and the representations of ethnic and religious identities in the conflict narratives focusing on the most-cited and vicious conflicts in Jos which occurred in 2001, 2008 and 2010. Thus, mediatized conflict research is revisited, placing media logics at the heart of the conflict. The text proposes Solutions-Review Journalism (SRJ) as a framework for conflict reporting, and argues that a review process is necessary to measure impact.
